# Equality in Enfield: Policy change

Enfield REC and Middlesex University feel that Enfield encapsulates sharp inequalities of ethnicity, gender and class and represents a significant case study for exploring the effect of the Government's new policy changes on all equality areas. Hence, equality groups, third sector organisations, service providers and local policy makers were invited to a joint consultation on 18<sup>th</sup> November to:

- Discuss the equality impact of policy changes on diversity groups in Enfield (including ethnic minorities, women, people with disabilities and the elderly)
- Identify key areas of intervention to empower less advantaged individuals and groups to navigate effectively in the new policy context
- Identify knowledge gaps and strategies to gather evidence of the effects of the policy changes as they occur over time
- Raise awareness within the local communities and among policy makers

Roger Hallam set the scene concerning the major areas of change in the policy environment in Health and Social Care: Education: Benefits: and the 'Big Society'. The Chief Executive Officers of Enfield Disability Action, Age UK (Enfield), Enfield Women's Centre and EREC all highlighted issues of concern in their specialist areas. National and local policy issues were set in the social/economic context of the Borough by Cllr Del Goddard (Cabinet Member for Regeneration and Improving Localities). He emphasised the importance of class, and explored the effects of poverty and inequalities in education, health and ethnicity and spatial disadvantage and how the communities may be supported by the local Council. The ECEN Co-ordinator addressed how the changing environment would affect the voluntary sector, especially with the coalition government's 'Big Society' agenda.

From Middlesex University Professor Eleonore Kofman spoke about the Inequality in London and Enfield, including class and Alessio D'Angelo gave examples of how the effect of the changes on the local community could be monitored. EREC and the Middlesex University will be producing a working paper, highlighting the main outcomes and incorporating recommendations and suggestions for the way forward from this event.

Held at Trinity-at-Bowes Church on Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> October, the packed programme included a talk on the lvory Coast by Historian, Heather Pascall, who outlined its historical, economic, social and political developments.

Ken Allen, Chair of ECA opened the celebrations. Bevin Betton, EREC Chair talked about the significance of the Black History Month and its relevance to the present day.

Attendees were entertained by the TAB Youth Choir and live music from 22 United the Jazz Band whilst partaking in light refreshments.

# **Define your Identity - 2011 CENSUS**

#### 27th March 2011 is Census day

The census is a count of all people and households in England and Wales and is carried out by the Office for National Statistics (ONS). It takes place every 10 years and everyone is asked the same questions on the same day in order to take a snapshot of the population at one point in time.

That is why it is so important that everyone takes part - your community and family will benefit.

The information collected on the questionnaires is used to help government and local authorities plan the services and resources people need, such as transport, housing, healthcare and education. The amount of money your council has to spend on these important services is based on population statistics from the census.

Questionnaires will go out by post to all householders during March 2011 ready for completion before, on or as soon as possible after census day, 27th March. You will need to fill in the paper questionnaire and return it by post in the pre-paid envelope provided or complete it online.

Every householder must, by law, complete and return a 2011 Census questionnaire.

### Response to the Government Equalities Office Specific Duties Consultation

EREC was part of the response submitted by Race on the Agenda (ROTA) to the Specific Duties Consultation on behalf of the Winning the Race Coalition. While the Public Sector Equality Duty is an improvement on the existing general duties, the response highlights a number of unresolved issues. In particular, it emphasises the importance of equality impact assessments in enabling citizens to genuinely hold public authorities to account. It also raises concerns over requirements to allow a public authority to set just one or two equality objectives. By creating prioritised groups and communities, this requirement may pit equality strands or issues relevant to different equality characteristics against one another.
