## **Strategic Race Forum**

#### Agenda moves from Regeneration to Poverty and Fairtrade

The last Strategic Race Forum held in November 2007 looked at Regeneration and the impact on Black and Minority Ethnic communities. The forum received a presentation based on one of the last major investigations undertaken by the Commission for Racial Equality (CRE).

With billions of pounds spent on physical regeneration, the effects major projects have on an area and its people can be dramatic and lasting. Government investment is largely in deprived areas where many of Britain's ethnic minority population are based.

The report was a response to allegations of unequal distributions of funds, failure to consult ethnic minority groups and concern that regeneration does not consider the disadvantages of some ethnic groups. The CRE asked whether spending was helping to promote integration and cohesion and close some of the inequalities that exist between different ethnic groups.

A key point was that local authority's race equality scheme and action plan should provide a framework for assessing, monitoring and consulting on its regeneration policies and proposals, ensuring all three parts of the race equality duty—to eliminate unlawful discrimination, promote equal opportunity and promote good race relations are met. Points debated by forum members to be taken forward by EREC at a strategic level included, establishing strong links with the Equality and Human Rights Commission, the regeneration of Edmonton Green and the Place Shaping agenda in Enfield.

The next meeting in March is a packed programme with presentations on Poverty (based on the Joseph Rowntree 2006 Research), Support to Community and Voluntary Sector and Fairtrade.

The Local Development Framework underpins the Council's pioneering new Place Shaping initiatives. As part of the LDF the Core Strategy, launched in February sets out policies and programmes for new homes, shops and businesses, improved transport systems and better employment prospects. As part of the LDF will be the launch of the Central Leeside Joint Action Plan and North East Enfield Action Plan.

Also launched in January the North London Waste Plan was which aims to ensure that appropriate sites are identified for the wide range of waste facilities needed to manage waste produced in North London.

### Anne Frank (+ you )Free Exhibition at Southgate College

Enfield Council presents this powerful touring exhibition from the Anne Frank Trust, using modern multimedia presentations to tell the tragic story of Anne Frank and the horrors of Nazi—occupied Europe.

Over 60 years after her death, the 13 year old who kept a diary whilst hiding with her family from the Nazis, is still remembered.

"What's the point of war? Why, oh why can't people live

together PEACEFULLY? Why all this destruction? .....

Oh why are people SO CRAZY? " (Anne Frank, 3 May 1944)

You will learn all about Anne Frank's story and that of her family. The exhibition shows the history of the holocaust and more recent genocides as well as contemporary issues including racism in football, bullying and the plight of child soldiers.

There are five themes in the exhibition, linked to Anne's life and writing:

Racial hatred; Conflict and peace; Inclusion and exclusion; Democracy and dictatorship; and Responsibility and indifference.
